December 20, 2022 update -Domes at risk of demolition, next 6 months critically important



It has been a very eventful few weeks for the Domes. The future of this treasure has never been more in question than it is today following the passage of Resolution 22-1184 at the December 15 meeting of the Board of Supervisors, but hope remains,

thanks largely to your incredible outpouring of support for the Domes. Your continued support will be more important than ever over the next 6 months as the fate of the Domes is explored and brought before the Board for a decision next summer. Without your outreach, this treasure is at genuine risk of demolition!

## 12/6 Parks Committee meeting

As reported earlier, the Parks Committee heard a resolution (22-1184) at their December 6 meeting that would "rescind" the County's existing policy, established in 2016 in Resolution 16-200 to "pursue the repair and preservation of the existing Mitchell Park Conservatory Domes." MPA, along





with our partners at <u>Docomomo-US/Wisconsin</u> and the <u>National Trust for Historic Preservation</u>, strongly urged members of the public to write to your elected officials encouraging them not to take this regressive step backwards. While we support forward motion and exploring options, we believed explicitly rescinding the established policy without the requirement of any involvement from the public or the expertise of individuals familiar with older buildings would fly in the face of public opinion and not provide Supervisors the critical facts needed to make informed decisions about the future of the Domes. You agreed, and **over 700 people sent letters to your elected officials!** 

As a result of this flood of opposition to demolition, the resolution was amended to "expand" the current policy rather than "rescind" it, and an additional clause was added specifying that the new policy "does not advocate for, suggest, or show preference for one potential option over another." The amended resolution passed the Parks Committee unanimously and was sent to the full board.

At this same meeting, the County's Office of Corporation Counsel (OCC, attorneys) issued a new legal opinion regarding the implications of listing the Domes on the National and State Register of Historic Places. Informed by input from the City of Milwaukee's Historic Preservation staff and legal counsel from the National Trust for Historic Preservation, the new opinion corroborated what MPA and other preservationists have been saying since Day 1: listing the Domes on the Register does not tie the County's hands in any way, and they would retain final decision making authority regarding the future of the Domes. The National Trust provided testimony as well, thanks in part to MPA's outreach, and the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) provided written explanation of the nomination process. Now that this issue has been cleared up, we are hopeful that the nomination, vetoed by the County Executive and not overturned by the Board out of fear of it tying their hands, can be reintroduced so the Domes can be recognized for their significance and Historic Tax Credits can be more quickly accessible should the County decide to move forward with this important preservation funding tool. ## 12/15 Board of Supervisors meeting

Resolution 22-1184 next made its way to the full Board with two potential resolutions. The first noted that inaction is tantamount to demolition by neglect and was not an option. This good amendment sets the stage for a decision to be made and does not allow for continued delay. It passed unanimously. Unfortunately, a second amendment that would have significantly improved the resolution in a number of ways, especially by requiring the expertise of outside resources familiar with how older buildings work (to be paid for through funds already allocated toward Mitchell Park improvements) failed 6-11. The final resolution then passed 16-1.

### Where does this leave us?

The resolution as passed is available <a href="here">here</a>. The County - particularly the Parks Department, OCC, Budget Office, and Comptroller (accountant) - are charged with bringing details on 4 options to the Board in July: demolition, minor repairs, full renovation, and implementation of the Task Force Plan. Each option must include costs, project scope, funding sources, potential governance structure changes, and long term options for the wider Mitchell Park. The Parks Department has openly admitted it is not an expert on old buildings and preservation, but we are hopeful that it will reach out for guidance to those who are in order to present the most accurate picture of what is possible at the Domes and present solutions driven not out of fear or scarcity but out of a sense of possibility and stewardship.

We do not believe this treasured Milwaukee landmark is simply an "unsolvable math problem" as it has been referred to. To relegate a place so important to the community to a series of number shuts down the conversation before it can begin. The fact is that the Domes are incredibly important to the community, and restoring them would save environmental resources, honor our stewardship of an architectural icon, provide important year round access to the proven health benefits of green space, and could be a health, jobs, and equity driver for the entire neighborhood. Preservation can also be achieved economically through Historic Tax Credits and partnerships, as opposed to spending taxpayer dollars on the senseless demolition and landfilling of this important place. It simply takes vision and leadership.





MPA has and will continue to serve as a resource to County decision makers on the possibilities of a preservation solution, including a conservancy model, which would allow a nonprofit partner to take over much of the management, fundraising, and financial burden from the County without sacrificing public oversight.

## What can you do to help?

The next 6 months are more important than ever, and your continued outreach to your Supervisors can help ensure that when they are presented with options in July, they know a decision supporting demolition will be unacceptable to their constituents. # December 1 update - Major threat to Domes at 12/6 meeting, urgent action needed now

The Domes need you NOW! The 9:00am <u>December 6 meeting of the Milwaukee County Committee on Parks & Culture</u> will include a new resolution that would rescind the <u>County Board's established policy of pursuing repair of the Domes</u>. It will also direct the County to explore options with costs for the future of Mitchell Park and the Domes including demolition, addressing deferred maintenance, full restoration, and implementation of the <u>Domes Task Force Plan</u> and present a report by mid-2023. <u>See the proposed resolution here.</u> While we support exploring paths





forward, rescinding the County's established policy of preservation is a dangerous and unfounded step and is not necessary to explore all options.

Further, the resolution as written does not require the expertise of any engineers familiar with older buildings nor any participation from the County Board or public.

We believe the public's consistent support of preservation, numerous <u>studies</u> showing the long term viability of preservation, and cost-reducing opportunities like Historic Tax Credits and partnership-based conservancy models must be thoughtfully considered while developing options for a way forward. A more thoughtful approach would be to hold this resolution until it can be crafted to include additional provisions that provide for the information the Board needs to make informed decisions without rescinding current policy unnecessarily.



# November 23 update - The rollercoaster continues, important meeting 12/6



The past two months have seen their share of ups and downs in the effort to secure a long-term future for our beloved Domes. MPA and Save **Our Domes have** succeeded in elevating the public's concern over the future of the Domes into a top level issue for **County Supervisors and** administration. Despite some steps backwards. we remain optimistic that we are moving toward clarity and a partnership-based preservation solution for the Domes and

surrounding Mitchell Park. Read on for details and how you can make a difference at the December 6 Committee on Parks & Culture meeting.

## 2023 Budget

The adopted 2023 County budget includes an amendment allocating significant funds to various capital improvements in Parks, including \$288,000 for Mitchell Park improvements. While the amendment does not specifically tie this funding to the Domes, cosponsor Sup. Rolland notes in a press release that the amendment "funds a new strategic plan to reimagine Mitchell Park and its Horticultural Conservatory - a long-deferred planning process that can now move forward." Other cosponsors have indicated the same, and it is expected that future resolutions will seek to allocate a portion of this





funding to the development of a Mitchell Park/Domes plan. The final budget as adopted is not yet online, but the proposed amendment can be seen <a href="here">here</a> on p.5.

## National Register nomination

Despite a 16-2 <u>vote</u> by the County Board in favor of nominating the Domes to the National Register of Historic Places, **the County Executive issued an eleventh hour <u>veto</u> citing an <u>unfounded fear</u> that listing in the Register would require the County to receive approval from the State and federal government before any action could be taken at the Domes. MPA has appeared at numerous public meetings to testify based on our daily interaction with preservation regulations that this is simply untrue. While designation would require conversations with the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO), <b>there is no regulatory authority for SHPO to prevent any action.** This important detail has been confirmed by SHPO, the entity in charge of enacting the statutes that have been cited by the County as tying their hands.

With 24 hours notice, the County board was presented with an opportunity to override the County Executive's veto on November 10. The issue was first heard by the Parks Committee, which voted unanimously to recommend overriding the veto despite strong opposition from the Office of Corporation Counsel, which again cited an erroneous fear that designation would tie the County's hands. MPA provided public testimony to the contrary. At the tail end of a 10-hour budget meeting, the full Board took up the veto override and ultimately abstained from voting on the issue. This effectively sustains the veto while allowing the question to be raised again and allowing the County to gain clarity on the implications of National Register listing. The issue is expected to arise again at the December 6 Parks Committee meeting, when representatives from SHPO will be present to provide clarity.

We continue to advocate for National Register listing for the Domes as a very low risk way for the County to honor the Domes' significance to the community and pave the way for Historic Tax Credits to be used to provide meaningful financial support for preservation efforts.

## <u>December 6 Parks Committee meeting</u>

The 9:00am December 6 meeting of the Committee on Parks & Culture is expected to be another important moment for the Domes. At this meeting, it





## is expected that a new resolution will be presented directing the County to produce a menu of options with costs for the future of Mitchell Park and

the Domes by mid-2023. We support moving toward a solution but the resolution unfortunately may include exploring demolition, potentially rescinding official County policy requiring pursuit of repair and preservation of the Domes. We believe the public's consistent support of preservation, numerous studies showing the long term viability of preservation, and cost-reducing opportunities like Historic Tax Credits and partnership-based conservancy models must be thoughtfully considered while developing plans for a way forward.

Unfortunately, the expected glazing mock-up and cost estimates providing proof of concept for the proposed 2019 glazing solution appears to be further delayed. It also does not appear that the report on the mesh and concrete inspection completed this summer will be made public at this meeting as the Domes Project Team had previously indicated. Additionally, we have learned that the Domes Project Team itself has been disbanded, with the Parks Department now taking the lead on future planning. We will continue to provide updates on the implications of this change as well as news on when these important reports will be made public. In the meantime, your support of the resolution to develop plans for Mitchell Park and the Domes on December 6 is important.

## September 27 update - We did it! ...but the future remains uncertain



We're pleased to report that the full County Board endorsed a resolution to nominate the Domes to the National Register of Historic Places by a 15-3 vote last week! This is great news for the Domes and marks the first major step forward toward a preservation solution in many years. While National Register listing will not provide protections for the Domes, it will honor their significance by adding them to this prestigious list and will open the door to Historic Tax Credits and other funding mechanisms only available to listed buildings. The majority of the nomination was already completed by a

preservation consultant and paid for by the County as part of the Domes Task Force's work, and the next step will be to complete the nomination and submit it to the State Historic Preservation Office, which has already determined it to be preliminarily eligible. The nomination process will take many months to complete, but it's on its way! MPA will continue to follow





the process to ensure it moves forward and keep you updated on progress and opportunities for support. We couldn't have done it without you; thank you! You can watch the meeting recording <a href="here">here</a> and read more about it in Urban Milwaukee.

Much uncertainty remains, however. The resolution passed with amendments noting that the County is not obligated to pursue Historic Tax Credits and resolving "to as soon as practicable adopt a plan for addressing the future and capital needs of the Mitchell Park Horticultural Conservatory, its home in the Mitchell Park Domes, and Mitchell Park."

Sup. Wasserman (Parks Committee chair), Sup. Martinez (District 12 for the Domes), and others are working on developing a resolution directing the County to create such a plan prior to July 2023. Current discussions include leaving all options on the table, including demolition. The County Board's official policy, however, is to pursue the restoration of the Domes, and the Domes Task Force investigated demolition and new construction only to determine that it would be infeasible and unsupported by the public. Nonetheless, we're excited by these efforts to move toward action and decisions and develop a comprehensive solution for the Domes and surrounding park. We will continue to work with the County as a resource on what is possible through preservation, encourage a solutions mindset, and advocate for public participation in the planning and decision making as well as inclusion of the Domes Task Force's work to develop a broad vision as the new plan is developed. The people have made their perspective very clear - preservation is the way forward - and we will work hard to make sure your voice is heard!

#### WHAT'S NEXT?

The December 6 Parks Committee meeting is shaping up to be a very important one for the Domes. During this meeting, the ZS Engineering glazing (glass) study is expected to be released to the public. This builds on their 2019 report and is expected to provide the results of a mock-up of a proposed solution for fixing the glass, cost updates to do so, and a brief update on the condition of the concrete structure. The glazing is the most critical fix needed at the Domes. The meeting will also likely include a vote on the resolution under development directing the County to create a comprehensive plan for the way forward. ## September 14 update - Setbacks and Big Wins!



The past week has been a big one for the Domes! Efforts to secure a long term future for this beloved treasure suffered an unfortunate setback but also achieved an important step forward and promise of more to come!

First, the difficult news. Despite multiple voices from the public who submitted written

comments and took time from their day to speak in support, including MPA, the resolution to secure \$19 million in federal ARPA funding for the restoration of the Domes did not receive the support of the County's ARPA Task Force last Thursday. There is still a small possibility of adoption through referral to committee or the full board. We're disappointed that this once-ina-generation funding opportunity was not supported, and we fear that the lack of investment and commitment now will only cause costs to rise through inflation and deferred maintenance.

Committee members lamented the lack of a comprehensive plan for restoring the Domes. We know, however, that the Domes' glass and concrete need work, and this funding could have helped achieve that. We're afraid this is an example of **the perfect being the enemy of the good**. The longer a restoration plan is delayed, the more expensive it will become. **The alternative to doing nothing is the slow death of the Domes**, resulting in the mothballing of this important place, or worse, its demolition for a cost to taxpayers of \$15+ million. Nevertheless, we are encouraged by comments from Supervisors and Parks staff that **their opposition to this resolution is not an opposition to saving the Domes** and that the Domes should in fact be saved. ### Milwaukee, WUWM, KPVI, Architect's Newspaper.

This week's Parks Committee meeting provided much better news and tangible forward-looking actions toward saving the Domes! Following a long

conversation and public testimony from MPA and others, the committee supported a resolution to pursue listing the Domes on the National Register of Historic Places. A nomination has already been largely completed and paid for by the County, and the Domes have already been preliminarily determined eligible for listing. This resolution will ensure that nomination is completed and submitted. Contrary to popular belief, listing does not place restrictions on what the County can do with the property and is purely honorific. What it does is honor the Domes for their importance to the community by adding them to the official list of special historic places nationwide. It is also a prerequisite for the County to pursue Historic Tax Credits for the restoration of the Domes, which could provide upwards of \$7 million in funding if the County works with partners to pursue them.

There was also a call for an additional resolution to be drafted for the next Parks Committee meeting (Dec. 6) directing the County to put together a plan for how to proceed with the Domes. While we're disappointed that conversation includes keeping all options on the table - including demolition, an idea that was deemed infeasible and unsupportable by the public during the Domes Task Force's work - we're excited by these efforts to move toward a solutions mindset. MPA will work hard to provide expert knowledge on the mechanisms of historic preservation throughout the resolution development and planning process and do all we can to keep the public's desire for preservation front and center. #### KEY POINTS:

- County Board policy is to pursue the repair of the Domes. This is a once-in-a-generation opportunity to fund much of the necessary work to restore the Domes for decades of future service.
- This appropriation would cover a significant portion of the funding expected to be necessary for the long term preservation of the Domes and would represent the initial County investment necessary to attract critical partnerships with public and private entities, grants, and private funds.
- ARPA funding for the Domes will save the County and the taxpayers money by using federal dollars for this necessary work rather than stretching a tight County budget with the full cost of repair or demolition.
- By promoting health and wellness and providing access to the proven physical and mental health benefits of green space to all County residents year round, the long term preservation of the Domes will help Milwaukee County be prepared to respond to future public health emergencies.
- 9:00am. The committee will be considering a resolution by Supervisors Martinez, Zerpa, and Clancy directing the County to pursue listing the Domes on the National Register of Historic Places. The majority of the National Register nomination is already written. Completing and submitting it would recognize the importance of the Domes at the local, state, and potentially national level and begin the process necessary for the Domes to take advantage of Historic Tax Credits to fund restoration work. #### KEY POINTS:

- The majority of the work is already done. Moving forward with the National Register nomination is a continuation of the work the County already began and paid for in commissioning the nomination years ago.
- Listing on the National Register is honorific and does not limit the County's options at the Domes. It would simply recognize how significant the Domes are to the community, state, and even the nation.
- Pursuing nomination poses little risk to the County, as the Domes have already been determined preliminarily eligible for listing by the State Historic Preservation Office.
- Listing on the the National Register is a necessary step for the County to take advantage of Historic Tax Credits for the repair of the Domes, which could provide up to 40% of of qualified rehabilitation expenditures back. Despite being a government entity, the County CAN still benefit from tax credits by working with partners (see details here).

June 16, 2022 update

Earlier this week, the County's

Domes Project Team presented an

update to the County Parks

Committee on their work to explore

next steps for the Domes' future for the County Board to consider. This included the completed report from contractors Baker Tilly and Husch Blackwell analyzing the financial and legal aspects of the Domes Task Force





plan. Unfortunately, the contractors' scope of work was limited to an analysis of the Task Force plan, and did not explore possible additional funding sources such as ARPA.

This analysis, while finding flaws in some of the financing mechanisms in the Domes Task Force plan, also contains great information on how an updated plan can be devised. It's also **one more in a number of consultant reports** that concludes that the Domes can have a successful future. The Domes Task Force plan focused on a high level vision that was meant to be explored deeper. While the new report does not believe the entire funding stack is feasible as written, it notes that many of the funding mechanisms, including Historic Tax Credits, ARE viable and encourages further study toward a solution.

The Domes Project Team also issued <u>a report</u> discussing the possibility of moving forward in a phased manner beginning with "repair/restoration and necessary code updates as an initial phase." However, the report also repeats the outdated claim from the 2016 GRAEF report that the Domes must be rebuilt in order to obtain 50+ years of life and that a repair option cannot obtain these same results. These findings are not borne out by established preservation practice and have been superseded by the more recent 2017 WJE report and 2019 concrete study demonstrating that a preservation solution is not only more affordable but can indeed provide decades of continued use. Staff comments at the meeting also very unfortunately noted

that all options, including demolition, could still be on the table.

While committee members and other supervisors shared various perspectives at the meeting, including calling into question the established policy of preservation, a feeling of frustration at the slow pace of progress was nearly universal, a perspective shared by MPA. MPA's comments, available here, encouraged a solutions-focused approach to moving forward. Now is not the time to despair but the time to band together and act. The people of Milwaukee County have consistently supported preservation of the Domes, and the time is now to move forward toward this goal. Solutions may be complex, but complexity must not stop us from moving forward in accordance with the will of the community and established County policy. Other cities nationwide have found solutions for similarly complex projects, and so can Milwaukee, but we must begin from a place of possibility, not negativity.





The County report also noted that the mesh inspection and repairs have been completed and that a report, including an updated evaluation of the Domes' concrete frame, will be available next month. Staff reports indicate that the results continue to show that **the concrete is in good condition and only needs maintenance**, **not replacement**. The <u>updated timeline</u> provided includes little action until the completion of a mock-up of a proposed glazing solution in November followed by updated repair cost estimates, another update to the Parks Committee in December, and public engagement in early 2023, with **final decisions on a way forward to be made in July 2023**.

MPA will continue our work to engage with the County and other partners to encourage and enable forward motion toward a long-term preservation solution, but your support and outreach is now more critical than ever! We must speak out and work together to move us forward and ensure this irreplaceable treasure is safe for years to come.

impossibility, and we must be solutions focused. Now is the time to allocate resources to exploring additional funding solutions and allocating resources toward known needed repairs. Preservation of the Domes is in line with <u>official County Board policy</u>. Demolition, which would cost a minimum of \$15 million, would be fiscally irresponsible, against the will of the public and established policy, and not advance County equity goals and cannot be an option.

- Federal ARPA dollars should be considered for the Domes before this
  once-in-a-generation FREE funding source disappears. In order to take
  advantage of this possibility, action must be taken now to plan for the
  future of the Domes and secure funding.
- Investment in the Domes is a matter of equity and in line with the County's stated vision of being the healthiest county in the state by achieving racial equity. Mitchell Park has been identified in the Parks Equity Index as being a high equity need park to be prioritized for investment. The neighborhood surrounding the Domes has limited green space and has been hit hard by the pandemic. Preserving and investing in the Domes and surrounding park would preserve and enhance year-round access to the proven physical and mental health benefits green space provides and help transform the Park into a learning, wellness, and horticultural campus that would increase health outcomes in the community.
- Preservation is a long term solution. Decades of preservation practice, along with the 2017 WJE peer review and 2019 concrete study demonstrate that a preservation solution is not only more affordable than reconstruction but can provide decades of continued use. The assertion that rebuilding is the only way to get a long life for the Domes is simply inaccurate.
- The County can submit the completed nomination for listing the Domes on the National Register of Historic Places. Doing so poses no risk to the County and would allow it to work with partners to take advantage of valuable Historic Tax Credits that could return of to 40% of expenditures on qualified rehabilitation work.

### March 2022 update

On March 15, the County's internal Domes Project Team (DPT) provided an update to the County Parks Committee on their ongoing work exploring possibilities for the future of the Domes. This work includes contracting with Baker Tilly and Husch Blackwell to explore the revenue sources for a restoration and revitalization of the Domes and surrounding park proposed in the 2019 Domes Task Force Plan, along with a new capital stack that could fund the project, and the legal aspects of partnerships that would need to be in place for a capital project at the Domes. A combined preliminary report has been completed, with the final report, including recommendations for the County, expected by the end of the month. At this time, these reports have not yet been made public.

The DPT also contracted with ZS Engineering to inspect the mesh currently installed in the Domes and complete Phase 2 of the 2019 Glazing Study,





including a mock-up and testing of the glazing system repair solution estimated to cost roughly \$20 for all three Domes. The mesh inspection is ongoing, and reports indicate that it is in good shape and is catching very little from the concrete structure, corroborating the results of the 2019 Concrete Study indicating that the concrete structure of the Domes is in good condition. Minor repairs are also being conducted on the structure, and a report on the mesh inspection is expected soon. Unfortunately, it was also reported that global supply chain issues have delayed materials needed for the mock-up, delaying completion of Phase 2 of the Glazing Study until October.

The DPT is also currently developing a public engagement plan, which will be a critical opportunity for the public to have a say in the future of the Domes before the County Board makes a final decision about next steps later this year. This public engagement is currently scheduled for June-July, but the DPT indicated that it may not begin until after the Glazing Study mock-up is completed, which would push this important engagement back to the end of the year and push final Board decisions back as well.

While the next DPT update is not scheduled until July, there is a possibility that a May update would occur in order to share the results of reports that have been completed to that point. **Please stay tuned here and on <u>Facebook</u> for news as it becomes available!** The Report and Timeline presented to the Parks Committee is available here for review.

## What would it cost to restore the Domes?

As conversations continue about the future of the Domes, there has been considerable talk about the costs associated with various options. Part of the work of the County's current <a href="Domes Project Team">Domes Project Team</a> is to review and update some of these numbers, but we feel it's important clarify the existing estimates to truly understand the cost of restoration:



- approx. \$20 million is the cost of restoring the Domes structure itself. This number comes from the County-commissioned 2019 Glazing Study, which determined the glazing could be replaced for years of life for a maximum of \$19.5 million, and the County-commissioned 2019 Concrete Study determining the concrete frame can last several more decades if a few maintenance interventions are included in future glazing replacement. Thus the total cost for restoring the Domes is approx. \$20 million. The 2017 Peer Review study comes to similar conclusions. A mock-up of the proposed glazing system is tentatively scheduled for early 2022.
- \$12 million is the approximate amount Milwaukee County would contribute to a renewed Mitchell Park and Domes under the 2019 Domes Task Force Plan's vision (roughly the same cost as demolition). This \$64 million vision would not just restore the Domes but invest further in the entire Michell Park, providing a path to financial sustainability for the Domes, creating 300 quality jobs, and transforming the Park into a center for urban agriculture, offering gardening and cooking classes, providing space for community gardens, and much more. The remainder of the funding would come from private capital, tax credits, and other outside sources.
- \$64 million is a solution proposed in the 2016 <u>Costs & Options report</u>, which would essentially reconstruct the Domes from the ground up. The later <u>Glazing and Concrete Studies</u>, along with the <u>Peer Review</u> of the Costs & Options report, indicate that reconstruction would be unnecessarily costly and not return its energy savings for 200 years. It is also not consistent with County policy to preserve the Domes.





The 2016 report is currently being updated as part of the Domes Project Team's work. Please spread the word about these important distinctions to your friends, <u>Supervisors</u>, and <u>County Executive Crowley</u>. There are financial challenges at the Domes, but they are surmountable!

### December 2021 update

Thank you so much to everyone who spoke at the November 1 public budget meeting, submitted an eComment or wrote to their Supervisor in support of the Domes. While the budget amendment did not pass, there was a strong public showing in support of the Domes that let our County Supervisors know that their constituents are paying attention and desire a long term preservation solution.

A further independent report by an internationally recognized firm specializing in historic buildings agreed that restoration is both possible


and preferable to alternatives and can be accomplished for \$20 million when considering the possible use of Historic Tax Credits.

### October 2021 update

The Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors are hosting the Annual Public Hearing on the County Budget this coming **Monday, November 1, at 6:00pm**. The Domes provide year round access to the proven physical and mental health benefits of green space that neighborhood and County residents deserve.
- Investing in the future of the Domes will create jobs. The Domes Task Force Plan, as it is envisioned, would create approximately 300 quality jobs for the neighborhood and region as Mitchell Park is transformed into a Learning, Wellness, and Horticultural campus, serving as a center



for urban agriculture, hosting research, offering gardening and cooking classes, providing space for community gardens, and much more.

• **Now is the time to act**. By investing in a long term preservation solution for the Mitchell Park Domes today, we can ensure that this treasure, one of the most iconic and beloved places in the County, continues to benefit the community for years to come.

### September 2021 update

On September 14, 2021, the Milwaukee County Department of Administrative Services (DAS) provided a substantial <u>update</u> on the Domes to the County Parks, Energy and Environment Committee and painted a discouraging picture for the future of the beloved icon. The update included a timeline of reports and other research that has transpired related to the structure and its financial viability as well as a game plan for an "incremental decision—making process" that would have the County Board deciding on a path forward by next summer.





The process is being led by a newly formed Domes Project Team consisting of the Parks Department, DAS, and the offices of the County Comptroller and Corporation Council, but not members of the County Board and with undefined opportunities for public engagement.

We applaud forward motion on the Domes, but we are troubled to learn that the process appears to have limited transparency, with the new Domes Project Team meeting without Board or public review or participation. Additionally, the picture being painted by the Project Team largely discounts the many years of hard work completed by the Domes Task Force. The Task Force Plan was not meant to be a perfect roadmap, but rather presented a vision of possibility, presenting a possible way forward that would support the will of the public and official County policy by preserving the Domes for decades to come, creating 300+ good jobs, and leveraging relatively limited County investment through tax credits and public-private partnerships.

We will continue to report on County plans and urge you to become involved.
